## Testamentary Capacity and the Role of the (Busy) Clinician

The request for testamentary capacity is not unusual in clinical practice, particularly in oncology and palliative care. Apart from relieving psychological distress, making a valid will may even be therapeutic, especially in the critically ill and the dying, who may want to finalise their final affairs.

However, there may be valid concerns that medical and psychological factors in acute and/or critical illness may affect patient's decisional capacity, thus placing into question the validity of the will.

The purpose of this sharing is to give participants a basic overview on the topic. Learning objectives for this session is to allow the participant to appreciate the process for testamentary capacity, reflect on their role in the overall assessment process, have the ability to identify complexity and make the necessary referrals to specialist psychiatry colleagues for discussion and further evaluation in more complex cases.
